101 LAZY WAYS TO GROW MARTAGON LILIES FROM SEED

Never one for following standard procedure, I always look for short cuts and innovative ways to accomplish objectives. Growing martagons from seed was no exception. Some of the "old" ways was time consuming and often restricted to specific crosses so I am not describing them in any detail.

Contrary to what I have seen published in texts, I find that martagon lilies do well in half to pretty heavy shade under trees and they like lots of peat moss and compost. Back some 20 or so years ago I found buying martagons very expensive, like \$35 and even \$45 for Larissa and I had to drive to Barrhead to get it. In todays terms that is over \$150 a bulb.

Initially I found that my martagons were prolific seed producers but I had a limited genetic pool of cultivars. I solved this by asking Fred Tarlton and Marvin Jocelin if I could collect seed heads from their garden. Marvin had the most with over 50 cultivars.

I grew the seed in barely moist peat moss, in glass pots, bags and full to the brim plastic containers. My best results were in sealed plastic containers (the ones you buy olives in) placed in transparent polythene garbage bags inside another transparent polythene bag. This is to avoid moisture loss from the plastic containers. I also placed a quarter cup of water inside the outer plastic bag. Plastic containers are permeable to oxygen but not to water vapour (moisture).

In the plastic containers I mixed the martagon seed or put them in 3-4 layers in the peat moss. Peat moss is acidic with a pH of 3-4 and is as a consequence suppressive of fungal and bacterial rots.

The pots were seeded in early October, kept at room temperature, 70° F or 24° C, until January 1st. after this time seeing obvious germination in the plastic pots they were then placed in bags and all into refrigerators again to prevent moisture loss. When the basement refrigerators were full, the bags with the plastic pots were placed in a cold garage where the temperature fluctuated between -5° C and 5° C above most days. By early April the seedlings from the rice grain like bulb would put up a leafy shoot. I could hold back this early germination if I did not place the warm room pots into the refrigerator or garage until February 1st on February 15th so that the seedling would not be germinating until May 1st.

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I would then transfer the germinated seedlings into small 3-inch greenhouse pots full of #4 moist compost peat/perlite mix. These pots were then placed in trays in the greenhouse.

All of the above was a lot of work over the next 10 years but I managed to grow very many thousands of martagon from seed.

This may be an effective but way too much work for me even if I was successful in developing new varieties.

WHAT WAS THE LAZY SOLUTION?

I would collect lots of martagon seed as soon as the heads were ripe in September. I then took handfuls of the seed and scattered them under my poplar tree wood lot at the bottom of my garden and under trees and shrubs in my hedgerow. I found that if we had a very early snowfall in late September or early October the seed would be germinated by late April or May of the next year. I guess the early snow would insulate them. If the snow was late into November the seed would not germinate until the following spring 19 months after sowing. If I used the martagon seed and placed it a half inch deep in rows like carrot seed, preferably in half shade in October I would have to watch that row and weed it the next summer with no seedling emergence but by the following April (19 months) hundreds of seedlings would emerge.

Under the poplar trees, the wild raspberries, fireweed and hemp nettles would shade out the martagon seedlings by early June only giving them about 6 weeks of sunlight. Consequently, it took from 6 – 7 years for them to get big enough to flower. I helped them a bit by removing all vegetation with a mower in October so that there was no dead vegetation to shade them in early spring. For the last few years I have had hundreds of martagons, mostly white and pink in bloom with some unusual colours and shapes.

When I grew them in rows, like carrots, I had them bloom in 4 years from seeding but I cheated a little by spraying them every 2 weeks from late May with canola fungicide. This kept them green until August by preventing infection by the Botrytis fungus. For some strange reason when I grow them in "carrot type" rows I get a much greater diversity of colour and unusual ones from maroon to red and yellow and even sterile types.

So next time you have martagon seed follow the above procedure and you will have martagons galore if you have the patience. Do not forget to use up your seed every year from your mature martagon lilies and as time passes you will find yourself expectantly awaiting the arrival and flowering of new and unusual martagon seedlings every May and June.

Do you know what a species lily is?

Wikipedia provides the following definition: Lilium is a genus of herbaceous flowering plants growing from bulbs, all with large prominent flowers. Lilies are a group of flowering plants which are important in culture and literature in much of the world. Most species are native to the temperate northern hemisphere, though their range extends into the northern subtropics. Many other plants have "lily" in their common name but are not related to true lilies.

So, what does that really mean? If you've ever wondered where that beautiful cultivar that you have in your garden came from, it all started with a species lily. They are those wild or native lilies that exist across North America, Europe and especially Asia (Japan, China, Burma, and India) and were used by and continue to be used by hybridizers to create the incredible magnificent lilies we see today. A classic example is the well known martagon Mrs. R.O. Backhouse, which is a cross between L. martagon x L. hansonii.

As is the case with so many species around the globe some of our lily species are in jeopardy because of development or habitat destruction. We as lovers of Genus Lilium have a responsibility to ensure the preservation of these unique and diverse lilies. There are generally a couple of species lilies available at annual bulb sales each year so hopefully you have a few growing in your garden.

So that brings us to the fun and fantastic contest that ARLS is going to be holding next summer!! To support and encourage the growing of species lilies we are asking you to take a photo with any of the species lilies growing in your garden and either share them on the ARLS Facebook page or send them to me at

For each individual species that is shared you will receive an entry for a draw at the end of the season to win a special species lily bulb.
