North American Lily Society 70th Annual International Lily Show & Symposium

Lynn Slackman, Show Chair, for the 70th Annual NALS event did an amazing job of organizing and executing the Show and Symposium. With sponsorship from NALS, the Mid America Regional Lily Society and various other generous donors and a committed group of volunteers they hosted a beautiful function at the Sheraton Westport Chalet Hotel in downtown St. Louis. The courtyard provided a nice area to sit and share stories with other lily nuts, while the rest of the hotel was warm and welcoming with meals that provided delicious flavour and insight into the local cuisine. The Show had a wide variety of Lilium on display, Species, Martagons, Asiatics, Trumpets, Orientals, and many interdivisional crosses. There was a total of 200 stems entered, with exhibitors from all across North America. Kathy Andersen again coordinated many skilled teams of judges to expertly evaluate the stems and determine the many award winners. In the end, ARLS' own Ieuan Evans captured the Isabella Preston Trophy for the best lily in the show with his stem of Megan Evans (read more about Ieuan's success in the later article). The room was also surrounded by many creative designs, demonstrating how lilies can be incorporating into arrangements to provide an incredible display. The tours of the Bellafontaine Cemetery & Arboretum and the Missouri Botanic Garden were incredible. The Cemetery established in 1849 provided an amazing walk through history and contained unique varieties of mature trees as well as many plantings of lilies. The Botanic Garden, one of the top in the world, provided an amazing collection of flora from around the world including many lily displays. The

tour of the greenhouses was interesting and informative and facilitated the education component of the Botanic Garden.

There were a multitude of other enjoyable activities for attendees of the Symposium to participate in. The bidding at the NALS Research Trust Fund Auction was intense with many coveted items up for sale. When all was done over \$4000 was raised for the Fund. The Awards Banquet was an excellent social event with a fabulous meal and an opportunity to honor the winners of the Show. There was also a great roster of speakers at the conference and you can look forward to an overview of their presentations in the upcoming Bulblets. Overall, the 70th Annual Show was fun and informative for all those that attended, a great chance to network and learn from other lily enthusiasts and see a part of the country and amazing lilies from across the continent.

If you haven't taken in a NALS Show yet, start planning to be in West Des Moines, Iowa from June 27 – July 01, 2018!



Remember the beetle emerges at the same time as your lilies and they are fertile. Keep watch. Kill the beetle. Report the beetle. AUGUST- SEPTEMBER is the month of new beetles. Kill them before they hibernate for the winter. Stir the dirt up first thing in spring to get them as they emerge from the soil. They do not hibernate under the lilies; they could be anywhere, including compost piles.

THE BEETLE INVASION CONTINUES... Part 2

I wrote my piece in the last newsletter, and I was mostly certain I had got them all. I was on the look out for red and figured any new ones would either fly in later or emerge from pupae that resulted from missed larvae. We went away for a couple weekends in July and I gave thanks for all that beetle yoga a few times while quadding and boating. And on my garden survey upon returning no new beetle activity. So, imagine my surprise when Aug 10 I went out to check my garden and Three beetles. Well they got bagged up, but Oh my! low and behold a new batch of larvae and eggs was all over Soiree. That took a couple days of close inspection and dedicated removal. Again, tie up the long hair it does nothing but get in the way. So, this is the question Is this a late breeding of the spring beetles going for a second egg laying spree? or are the early fall emergees fertile and starting a season early just to confuse the issue. Not really happy either way as it just means my beetle yoga in not April to June but all the way to the end of August. I know I will be in better shape but really eggs all the way to August! So, it is September now and I have not seen any beetles since Aug 10 and although I monitor the lilies there does not seem to be any new munching holes. Can I relax until spring now? Laurie Hepper

Wednesday morning the florists' box was loaded in the trunk of the car and we were off to the airport. As we entered the terminal in Edmonton I read the writing on the box: "Cut flowers – no plant material". I thought to myself, Dr. Ieuan Evans is a plant pathologist maybe that's why he did not realize that cut flowers are plant material. Anyway, when we placed the box on the conveyor we expected that Ieuan would have a visit from some of the Agriculture inspectors at the airport. But onto the plane we went, hoping that we would see the box in Saint Louis.

So, we landed and waited and waited, the luggage carousel was emptying and no box and then, to leuan's relief, down the chute came the box. At the hotel, we proceeded to the staging room and unpacked the box, the stems had travelled very well. Ieuan spent the next morning staging stems; many exhibitors stopped and looked because there were many impressive stems.

Friday morning was time for the judging and it became clear that there were a couple of stems that stood out from the rest. Ieuan's stem of Megan Evans, a dainty white pollenless Martagon, was one of those being singled out. When it came down to the vote for the Best Stem in the Show (Isabella Preston Award) it was clear that this little Martagon was going to win the honor hands down. But wait the accolades didn't stop there; the stem was also awarded the Earl N. Hornbeck Award for showing the greatest advancement in

hybridization, Jan De Graaff Award for best stem in Section D, Claude Shride Award for best hybrid lily of Martagon derivation, Fred Tarlton Award first place with highest bud count (30 – was actually higher than that), and the Ontario Regional Lily Society Award for best stem of a registered hybrid lily originated and named by a Canadian. The winning for leuan did not end there, some of his other stems were awarded; Emerson Hickling Award for seedling in Section C showing the most breeding advance, David Griffiths Award for best stem of an unnamed hybrid grown from seed by exhibitor, Michigan Regional Lily Society Award for best stem in Section E, Mears-Mersereau Award for best three stems of same species, variety, or cultivar, Barrie Strohman Award for the collection of 6 different lilies from any Division or Divisions, one stem each, identified, and Ed Robinson Award for collection of 3 different Martagon hybrid lilies, one stem each,

identified by name or seedling number/code.


